Director's Notes

Alan Ayckbourn has been said to be the most performed living playwright in the world. There is no plausible way either to prove or disprove this. But he is undoubtedly very, very, popular.....

My first experience with the Amazing Mr A was at the Criterion 32 years ago. I had been a member for 5 years and had been in a lot of plays, but this time I was working on Props. 'Absurd Person Singular' is a 3 act play with 3 complete, working kitchens. A props nightmare. But throughout rehearsals, I couldn't stop laughing at the acutely observed characters and the ridiculous, but painfully real, situations, and wondering at a hilarious comedy which yet contained a hard, black line weaving it's way through the play to an inevitable and frightful conclusion. I was hooked!

In the early 90s, I was lucky enough to be spending time every year in Scarborough, where I became an almost permanent fixture at the Stephen Joseph Theatre, seeing many Ayckbourn productions, as well as the exciting work of new, often young, dramatists who were nurtured and encouraged by the great man himself. This experience cemented my respect for his work but though I had been in an Ayckbourn production at the Criterion, I hadn't yet had the opportunity to direct one. So I was extremely happy and excited to be asked to direct 'A Chorus of Disapproval'.

As with all his plays, Ayckbourn explores the less pleasant aspects of the human condition, mirroring the setting of the 'Beggar's Opera' in the underbelly of a corrupt and violent 18th century London with the activities of a group of actors who are not all that they seem at first sight. The result, though very funny, is unexpected. As ever, no Ayckbourn character survives without a painful scar.

If you enjoy watching this production as much as I have enjoyed working with my talented and creative cast and crew, you're in for a real treat!





The Beggar's Opera is a ballad opera in three acts written in 1728 by the poet John Gay. The story concerns Macheath, a famous highwayman, Peachum a corrupt thief-catcher, his daughter Polly and Lucy Lockit, both of whom Macheath agrees to marry.
