

In 2002 Annie Woodward and I embarked on the marathon that was David Edgar's *Nicholas Nickleby*. Eleven hours of drama were pruned to seven—ish and the 50 strong cast performed the two plays alternatively over a period of two weeks. It was an exhausting experience for the cast, who all had day jobs, but we hoped they also found it as rewarding and exhilarating as we did.

Since then I have been looking for an adaptation that did justice to *Great Expectations*, which has long been a favourite book of mine, and ideally, one which avoided the heavy use of narration which had evolved post *Nicholas Nickleby*.

A year ago. Jane Railton drew my attention to this version which she had seen at the Royal Exchange Theatre and greatly enjoyed. After this recommendation a debate with the theatre ensued; but we met with obstacles in obtaining the rights to perform it as James Maxwell ,the adaptor, had since died. But happily permission was given earlier this year, and we were able to go ahead with what is an amateur premier of this adaptation.

I love this version which tells the story in a clear and pacy way using a relatively small team of actors to play a variety of roles. It is also lovely to welcome newcomers to this stage along with some familiar faces!

The work on the roof in the summer has now given us access to the whole of the stage area and this has allowed Pete Bagley to create a flexible and atmospheric set. Even more exciting is the fact that the building work has now resulted in new and hygeinic loos backstage for the first time in my long association with this theatre. What joy!




INTRODUCTION
