When I was handed a copy of this play I knew nothing about it. I'd never heard of the play or the author. The title didn't seem particularly exciting or inspiring, so when I sat down to read it, my expectations weren't high. As I was unaware of any performances, I assumed that it wasn't popular and would therefore be possibly boring, or else difficult to understand. How wrong could I be! After the first few pages I knew that I was experiencing something very special; a play that speaks to everyone.

I couldn't put the play down; it was making me laugh; it was drawing me in to the situation these two men found themselves in and the very different, yet in some ways, strangely similar worlds they inhabited, and I desperately wanted to know what the next page would bring. As I continued to read and to listen to the voices - one old, grumpy guy talking with one young, angry guy I knew I really wanted to direct this play. And when I found that I was not only reading and laughing, but also reading and crying, as well as enjoying a growing feeling of warmth and happiness in the company of Mr Green and Ross Gardiner, I knew I wanted to share this play with as many people as possible. A play with only two characters can present difficulties; certainly for the actors, often for the director and sometimes for the audience. It's important to find two people who will be able to work closely together and relate to each other, both on and off stage. After a lengthy reading and audition process, for which I must thank and congratulate the many talented and committed company members, both young and not so young who took part in this process, I found two men who could do just that, Keith Railton and Chris Firth.

I must, of course, leave you to judge for yourselves, but for me, after many enjoyable weeks of preparation and rehearsal, they have brought this play to vibrant life, by becoming Mr Green and Ross Gardiner. I hope their thoughtful, intelligent, funny and moving portrayals of two very real people will bring you as much pleasure as they have to me.

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
