Director's Note

When we were considering how to celebrate our 50 years, it was generally felt that the programme should include both work new to our company,- highlighted most, I think, in the Festival of One Act Plays last June- along with plays done successfully in the past. Of these Guys and Dolls ran its joyous and melodic way last Christmas, and When we are Married was the other chosen revival. This was one of the theatre's earliest productions; first performed here in December 1961, with our much loved John Hathaway playing Gerald Forbes!

I have long been a lover of Priestley and Stephen Daldry's production of An Inspector Calls, rightly still running after some years, has done much to bring his writing alive to a new generation. As in An Inspector calls, Priestley has chosen in When we are Married, to look back from the point of writing, and set this in an earlier period where he could laugh at the pretensions and mores of another age.

Although Priestley aims to prick the pretensions of the smug and complacent, his touch here is a warm and affectionate one. It is 1908, and assured Maria is hosting this party; she simply wants it to be a success and flaunt her status and possessions along the way!

Meek Annie dreams of a life of fun and sees release from her hectoring husband and the downtrodden Herbert finds the strength to assert himself against his domineering wife. All is resolved by the unlikely duo of a drunken photographer and a blowsy barmaid who have a more generous and clear-sighted view of the world.

It has been a delight to welcome the return of a very old friend Bob Morley to design the set. Those of you who saw and admired the set of The Herbal Bed will remember his remarkable skill and artistry. I am sure you will love his creation of the Edwardian parlour.




